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DIRECTOR'S CORNER



Vatican II's Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy (CSL), whose 50th anniversary we just celebrated, has quite a bit to say about liturgical music, i.e. "sacred music." This document, foundational to our worship today, exhibits a tension between, on the one hand, the following statements:

From CSL #114:

The treasure of sacred music is to be preserved and fostered with great care.

From CSL #116:

Gregorian chant [is] specially suited to the Roman liturgy: therefore, other things being equal, it should be given pride of place in liturgical services. But other kinds of sacred music, especially polyphony, are by no means excluded from liturgical celebrations, so long as they accord with the spirit of the liturgical action, as laid down in Art. 30.

And on the other hand, from CSL #121:

Composers, filled with the Christian spirit, should feel that their vocation is to cultivate sacred music and increase its store of treasures. Let them produce compositions which have the qualities proper to genuine sacred music.... providing ... for the active participation of the entire assembly of the faithful.

Also, from CSL #123:

The Church has not adopted any particular style of art as her very own; she has admitted styles from every period according to the natural talents and circumstances of peoples... in the course of the centuries, she has brought into being a treasury of art which must be very carefully preserved. The art of our own days, coming from every race and region, shall also be given free scope in the Church, provided that it adorns the sacred buildings and holy rites with due reverence and honor; thereby it is enabled to contribute its own voice to that wonderful chorus of praise in honor of the Catholic faith sung by great men in times gone by.

How do we reconcile the idea of preserving our sung heritage of the past with the need for new music that speaks to the hearts of today? This is one of the great challenges we face as the renewal of our Roman Liturgy continues to move forward. The good news is that we who are on the ground in our parishes probably have the greatest ability to answer this challenge.

One perhaps starts by looking at CSL #30, mentioned above as determinative:

To promote active participation, the people should be encouraged to take part by means of acclamations, responses, psalmody, antiphons, and songs, as well as by actions, gestures, and bodily attitudes.

We might also consider CSL #42:

[E] fforts also must be made to encourage a sense of community within the parish, above all in the common celebration of the Sunday Mass.

Our two NPM Chapters welcome **Fr. Michael Flynn, recently appointed Executive Director, Secretariat on Divine Worship, U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops**, who will give an address on this very issue at our Liturgy Day,
October 18 at the Cathedral of St. Thomas More
(9am-12:30pm). See page 3 in this newsletter for full details. Fr. Flynn's vision for living out this tension between the care for our cultural inheritance and forms of music that can be culturally meaningful to those who use them will give important insight into coming trends our liturgical worship.
